Peace Corps Week: Talking About HIV/AIDS

by Mary Ann Camp, RPCV Lesotho, Malawi, and Botswana (1998-2007)

As a 69-year-old with a background in nursing, I was not prepared for the pandemic of HIV/AIDS in Africa. You had to be there to experience

the devastation of a community, a village, and a family. When I talk to a group in the U.S. such as a youth group I am very open about the catastrophic effects on those remaining. I am open about the demise of the patient, the funeral, and the cultural practices pertaining to the funeral.

In Lesotho, my first country of service, after the burial the family and friends return to the home of the deceased. Before you go into the gate, you wash your hands three times to cleanse the bad sprits away that may have accompanied the body. This is a custom performed at most funerals.

The funerals I attended usually had a feast following the burial. Sometimes the deceased was buried in the hide of the animal which was butchered for the feast. The utensils were your own fingers. People would sit around the family compound, talking about the one who had passed, and remembering the good things. If you had a

few coins you would clandestinely give them to the family with the words, "Pepani, Pepani." I am sorry.

When I speak to groups of young people in the U.S., it is usually at schools or scout meetings. I tell them my story of a funeral for a 20-year-old soccer player in Malawi, where I also served. Thabo was very active in the village. He was a member of my Library Club, the *Edzi Toto* (no HIV/AIDS) Club, and the Garden Club. He was loved and respected by everyone, especially his younger brother who came to me and said, "I think Thabo has what we talk about in our meetings." He did. Three weeks later, the soccer team stood around Thabo's hand-made pine coffin with their soccer shirts reversed, showing respect for Thabo. The team left an open spot at the end of the coffin representing the broken circle.

Most young people can identify with this story, and when I tell it, questions usually follow such as, "Was he a



Liberia

Liberia underwent a period of 14 years of brutal conflict that devastated the country's infrastructure, resulting in widespread poverty, complete lack of or extremely limited agricultural production, and breakdown of family and community coping mechanisms. Schooling was badly disrupted as food-insecure families often employed children into income activities instead of sending them to school. The MOE is moving towards initiating greater community involvement in its school management-related programs and is mobilizing Parent Teacher Associations (PTAs) and creating awareness of community leaders to support the school feeding program at the community level.

drug user?” or, “Was he gay?” I respond by saying I didn’t think so, but that he had had many sex partners. This seems to remind the youths present at my Peace Corps talks of their accountability.

When I speak to adults, such as a Rotarian group, I related the story of my night watchman Aaron in Malawi, who was 65, a widower, and father of 11 children. His wife had died of HIV/AIDS some years before. Aaron always thought that he was “safe” from HIV/AIDS because, after all he was 65, and he knew it was a “problem for younger people.” He had told me that it was common belief that after you were 45, you could no longer get the virus. I posed the question to him, “Do you think the virus knows how old you are?” It caused him to think and he replied, “But I’m the same age as you are and you aren’t sick.” It was another opportunity to explain that you cannot tell by one’s appearance if a person is infected with this virus or not.

I flew home for my father’s funeral, and when I returned three weeks later to the village I was told that Aaron had

died two days after my own father. His son told me that Aaron had developed a swelling in his leg (karposi sarcoma) and that he died at the local hospital in Dedza. Losing Aaron was as painful as losing my own father.

While a Volunteer in Botswana, I became very close to my counterpart, Puso, age 26. We worked well together in the PMTCT (Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission) program. We made home visits together, did follow up HIV/AIDS testing visits, World Aids Day Projects, and Volunteer Counseling and Testing Projects. She was involved in many of my projects including being “Mother Christmas” at our first village-wide children’s Christmas party. She looked great in the Santa suit and beard.

Since I’ve been in the U.S., I always send her a birthday card on November 28. On December 20th of this year, though, I received an email from Puso’s fiance. It began, “Sebaga [my African name], how to tell you Puso has passed.” She died on her 27th birthday. She probably never received her card from me this year. It

was absolutely devastating. Was it HIV/AIDS? One can only surmise.

The power of HIV/AIDS follows you. It continues to be a monster that swallows you even after you’ve left your site. We must have that audacity of hope that President Barack Obama talks about. We must continue our service as returned Peace Corps Volunteers and talk about what life is like outside U.S. borders. We must be the change, not only by educating our communities at home about other cultures to dispel stereotypes, but also by sharing what we have in common: our humanity and our fight against HIV/AIDS.

Mary Ann Camp is a nurse with 38 years of experience. She began her Peace Corps service in 1998 with two years in Lesotho, working in community development in HIV/AIDS education; then, she served in Malawi in community-based HIV and AIDS education and prevention. Finally, she went on for two years in Botswana, focusing on mother-to-child HIV transfer prevention programs.
