From Peace Corps to Commissioned Corps: Careers for RPCVs in the U.S. Public Health Service

Returning from the fullness of international development through Peace Corps service often leaves returned volunteers disappointed by the empty career choices they encounter upon their return home. Many RPCVs wish to continue making a real difference in people's lives during everyday challenges and in times of disaster. If you can identify with these RPCVs, you may want to explore job opportunities with the United States Public Health Service.

The Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service (PHS) is comprised of highly trained, mobile, health professionals, whose mission is to protect, promote, and advance the health and safety of our nation under the direction of the Surgeon General and the Secretary of Health and Human Services. It is a Uniformed Service of the United States, with military rank and privileges, broken into eleven career categories: *dentist, dietitian, engineer, environmental health, health services, nurse, pharmacist, physician, scientist, therapist, and veterinarian*. The basic requirement is a BS from an accredited school relating to

one of these professions, which serves as part of your professional training as an officer in the Commissioned Corps.

While applying to receive your commission as a PHS officer, you will network with recruiting professionals and search listings to find a position within an agency or program that employs Commissioned Officers (*The information bar to the right describes the possibilities*). Once you are commissioned as an officer in the Public Health Service and have accepted a position with an agency, your career of maintaining the health and safety of peoples in need begins.

Historically, PHS Commissioned Corps officers worked to control the spread of contagious diseases such as smallpox and yellow fever, provided health-care to underserved groups, conducted important biomedical research, regulated the food and drug supply, provided health care to underserved groups, supplied medical assistance and disease control in the aftermath of disasters, and served in numerous other ways. More recently, officers of the PHS have responded to

various forms of disaster and conflict, including the 9/11 attacks, the tsunami in Southeast Asia, and hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Today, officers are required to become "deployment-ready" and provide their unique abilities to those who need it most.

Typically, PHS officers enjoy ancillary benefits beyond those of the regular civil service, including:

- when
- Department of Defense (DoD) benefits, such as Space-A travel, use of military commissaries, exchanges, and officers clubs;
- Opportunities for school loan repayment, further education, and career advancement;
- Opportunity to work in diverse geographical locations and transfer to different agencies/programs;
- Duty travel and transportation expenses paid by the federal government;
- Benefits accompany officer when transferring from one agency/program to another or from one position to another within the same agency/program;

- Only one license from any of the 50 States, Washington D.C., the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands or Guam needed to practice one's profession while employed in the federal government.

RPCVs have a head start in their transition to the Public Health Service:

- Certain medical requirements are already completed (e.g. physical exam, dental record, and vaccinations);
- Noncompetitive eligibility;
- Familiarity with federal service and the maintaining the public trust;
- PHS agencies prefer self-motivated, responsible, and mobile professionals, typical characteristics of RPCVs

Federal Career Intern Program (FCIP) by Tamara Webb, RVS Program Specialist

Federal human resources (HR) professionals today face a critical challenge with enormous implications for the rest of the government. A large percentage of the government's most experienced workers will be eligible to retire within the next 5 years. With a complex hiring system and specialized occupations, the federal government has been pressured to explore a variety of ways to help new talent quickly and smoothly transition into vacated federal positions and leadership roles. To help meet these goals, a number of federal internship programs have been established. The Federal Career Intern Program (FCIP) is one of these programs.

The FCIP was established under Executive Order in July 2000. In general, FCIP participants are appointed to a 2-year internship. Interns receive the same pay and benefits as regular federal employees at their grade levels, and they are eligible to receive pay increases and promotions, including accelerated promotions. Initial appointments can be made at any grade level for which the agency has a formal training program in place; although, the intent of the program is an initial appointment at the GS 5, 7, 9 level (www.USAJOB.S.opm.gov/B5A.asp). Upon successful completion of the internships, the interns may be eligible for permanent placement within an agency.

FCIP opportunities are not always easy to identify. "Career Intern" is a generic term, and agencies may use occupational titles as appropriate. Agencies may hire interns at any time and do not have to advertise the job openings in advance. The majority of interns holds at least a bachelor's degree and report having no prior federal service; however, qualifications and selection criteria vary considerably by and within agency. In order to locate an FCIP that is best matched to your background and interests, additional research especially focused on target agencies may be necessary. A list of websites describing various agency FCIP programs is included at the close of this article. On Friday, April 6, 2007, the Department of Transportation will host an FCIP information session for RPCVs that will take place at Peace Corps Paul D. Coverdell Headquarters in Washington, DC.
